Modernizing Spaces to Enhance the Student Experience

On Tuesday, **February 13**, voters will head to the polls to decide on a \$47.17 million capital project. This is the second of three planned capital project referenda (2021, 2024, 2027) to modernize and renovate our eight school campuses. The district has created a long-term plan to invest in periodic renovations and improvements to address infrastructure needs and enhance learning spaces, while also working with fiscal advisors to minimize the tax impact on our community.

If approved, the 2024 capital project would provide funding to make substantial expansions and renovations to Van Antwerp Middle School, including a cafeteria and classroom addition (\$25.3 million); modernization and upgrades at all five elementary schools with a focus on community areas like cafeterias, gyms, library media centers and the most outdated classrooms (\$20.4 million); as well as high-priority infrastructure work at Niskayuna High School including the replacement of the paneling system on the exterior wall of the auditorium (\$1.5 million).

The proposed tax increase (0.85%) would equate to \$42.75/year (per \$300k market value).

If approved, the proposed projects will further the work that began following voter approval of the 2021 referendum. Those projects focused largely on the high school athletic complex, the classroom addition and renovations at Iroquois Middle School (the first phase in our middle-level reconfiguration) and other infrastructure improvements at our elementary schools. The district prioritized that work in the first

Middle Level Reconfiguration Modernizing Van Antwerp

If approved, the 2024 capital project will provide the funding needed to transform Van Antwerp (VA) into a grade 5-6 campus as part of the district's planned middle level grade reconfiguration. Once complete, the reconfiguration will serve all Niskayuna students in grades 5-6 at VA and all students in grades 7-8 at Iroquois.

In this project we propose expanding and improving our VA campus as follows:

- · Constructing a new, larger cafeteria with natural light
- Constructing new classrooms and a flexible project room in the second floor of the addition
- Renovating the wing occupied by district office staff to create 11 new classrooms
- Creating a new library media center and music ensemble classrooms

- Improving building accessibility and traffic flow and reducing elevation changes in the building
- Upgrading building systems including electrical, HVAC and plumbing

If this referendum is approved, the work at VA will be completed using funds from the 2021 referendum (\$7-\$8 million) and the 2024 referendum (\$25.23 million).

We anticipate construction at VA will commence in spring/ summer 2025 and be completed in phases over the next three years.

Why is middle school reconfiguration necessary and important?

Niskayuna educators see the new configuration as a unified middle school program on two campuses. The benefits teachers have identified include:

- Increased capacity to serve anticipated growth in class sizes
- An enhanced academic experience for fifth graders that includes world languages and other middle school offerings
- Expanded potential for accelerated courses for eighth grade students.
- More opportunities for teacher/student collaboration
- An equitable experience for all Niskayuna students

When will the new middle level reconfiguration take effect?

It is projected that Iroquois will house all students in grades 7-8 at the start of the 2026-27 school year. Van Antwerp will serve all 5th and 6th grade students beginning at the start of the 2028-29 school year.

Progress at Iroquois Middle School

The addition at Iroquois, approved in the 2021 capital project, is quickly taking shape. The structure will eventually house 20 classrooms and additional support spaces.

The exterior metal panel installation is in progress. First floor leveling and moisture mitigation have been completed and flooring installation is ongoing. Casework and cabinetry has been delivered and installation is underway in the new science rooms and other classrooms in the addition.

New fire alarm panel testing was completed in early January and permanent staircases are now accessible. New student bathrooms are being constructed in the areas previously occupied by 2nd floor science classrooms.

Once work on the addition is complete, our focus will turn to classroom renovations throughout the remainder of the building to result in bright and modern learning spaces with new flooring, finishes and fixtures. We anticipate all work at Iroquois (construction and renovation) will be completed by early 2026.

Our goal in the 2024 capital project is to create modern, inviting spaces that foster collaboration, connection and community amongst students, faculty and staff. We are also prioritizing the work needed to complete our middle level reconfiguration. The details of that work will be explained in this newsletter.

NHS Infrastructure Improvements

Another component of the proposed capital project focuses on high-priority infrastructure improvements at Niskayuna High School. This includes the exterior wall of the auditorium, which is original to the late 1950s construction of the building. A new exterior wall system will be constructed as water penetration is evident inside the auditorium. The auditorium serves as an important gathering space for students, faculty and staff from across the district, as well as the community. If approved, the capital project will provide the funding needed to replace the wall system and protect the auditorium as the central performing arts space in the district.

Elementary School Projects

In "walk-throughs" of our elementary schools, 2024 Capital Project Committee members concluded that common areas such as cafeterias, library media centers and gymnasiums were dated and lacked functionality. Most of these spaces have not been updated in several decades.

The district's goal is to make common areas more welcoming and modern. Across our five elementary campuses, work will include:

- Renovation of cafeterias: installation of air conditioning, new lighting, flooring, and audiovisual technology
- Renovation of library media centers: lighting upgrades, new flooring, additional shelving and storage, and fresh paint
- Renovation of gymnasiums: lighting upgrades, equipment replacement (e.g. basketball hoops and wall mats), ceiling improvements, and audiovisual technology for assemblies and presentations
- Targeted modernization of the oldest, most outdated classrooms in each building
- Playground improvements

The elementary school work would be completed in phases beginning in summer 2025.



District Administrative Offices Relocation

In order to create capacity for all students in grades 5-6 at VA (see page 2 for details), we must move our district offices so those spaces can be converted to 11 classrooms. Last spring, district leaders solicited information from local commercial property owners and realtors as part of this process.

The district has identified Highbridge Development as its partner for a new district office, and is in negotiations to develop office space for lease at 1430 Balltown Road for use as our administrative offices. We anticipate the space will be renovated and ready for use by fall of 2024.

The funding for this lease will come from the general fund and is not included in the proposed 2024 referendum.

Gatehouse at NHS

We are thrilled to announce the community fundraising group "Niskayuna Stadium Entryway Project" has reached the donation target to begin construction on a gatehouse building at the entry to the track and turf field.

The gatehouse, which is not included in the capital project, will house a ticket booth, athletic storage and restrooms. Donations are still being accepted and pavers are being sold to help cover project costs. The district is deeply appreciative of the support in making this exciting addition to the new facility a reality.

Capital Project Q&A

Isn't the district in the middle of a capital project?

In planning for the current capital project, the district did extensive assessments of infrastructure and educational space needs. The result was a long-term plan that divided the work into three capital projects (2021, 2024, 2027). The goal of this referendum is to secure funding to make repairs and renovations while modernizing learning spaces for students, faculty and staff across the district. The multi-referendum approach minimizes the impact on the school budget and taxpayers by managing debt levels and maximizing state aid for school construction.

The 2021 capital project included money for renovating Van Antwerp (VA). Why is more funding needed now?

The 2021 capital project included plans to address work needed at VA. However, the impact of inflation and

rising construction costs resulted in bids for the work at Iroquois MS being higher than projected pre-pandemic. As a result, completing the anticipated work at VA will require funding beyond what is available through the 2021 referendum. It is important to note that between \$7 million and \$8 million in funding is allocated in the 2021 capital project for work at Van Antwerp, which will help complete the proposed work.

When will the new grade-level configuration take effect?

It is projected that Iroquois will be home to all students in grades 7-8 in the fall of 2026 and that VA would be home to all students in grade 5-6 beginning in the fall of 2028. Between those two school years, it is anticipated that all students in grade 6 would attend VA. Having a single grade level at Van Antwerp during this time will allow construction to continue in phases throughout the building while minimizing disruptions to educational programming.

If bids for any aspect of the work come in over budget, how will it be handled?

If the proposal is approved, the district will send the community regular updates about the plan, including construction timelines, details about the work that is advancing or any adjustments due to budget/other factors. In the event a bid comes in higher than anticipated, the district would evaluate options and consider how to adapt and prioritize the overall budget for improvements.

What happens if the proposal is not approved?

If the proposal is not approved, district leaders would use feedback from voters (including an exit survey being conducted the day of the vote) to help determine next steps and ultimately the next capital project proposal. Preserving and improving facilities for current and future students is a clear district priority. Voter-approved capital projects are the best way that school districts are able to leverage state aid to update facilities. Absent voter approval the proposed work is unlikely to move forward on the timeline proposed, and pressing facilities needs could have a greater impact on the general fund budget.

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
